He states that the Commission received their first quarterly payment of \$124,223, which includes the amount deducted by NJDEP for fuel for the harvesting program. He reviews expenses including payroll, Princeton Hydro, the Commission's planner and bookkeeper, and the Weed Harvesting Program expenses. He notes interest revenue and the balance after expenses is \$520,112. Chair Smith entertains a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. Commissioner Crowley makes a motion. Mrs. Lyons states that the Commission received land use applications which are available on the Commission OneDrive account. The Commission received monthly updates from their planner, Russell Stern and Princeton Hydro.

Chair Smith states that the Weldon Quarry settlement is coming to an end after several years.

IX. LHC Commissioner's Comments

Commissioner Wilsusen states that due to the lack of rain the lake is low.

X. Administrator's Update

Colleen Lyons provides an update on her activities. She states that all closeout documents for the NJDEP 319 Grant have been submitted. Mrs. Lyons states that the Commission and Princeton Hydro will meet with NFWF to discuss their proposal to use remaining funds under the grant for plantings in Hopatcong State Park. Planning is underway for the 2024 NFWF Grant for implementation of a stormwater conveyance in Witten Park in Hopatcong.

XI. Weed Harvesting Report

Mr. Calderio states that the two machines that were down have been repaired. He states that he started pulling out the machines in preparation for the boat races. They will be keeping two at Lee's County Park to finish up harvesting. He states that 1,682 cubic yards have been harvested and will be transferred from the Snowbowl property to the Morris County MUA.

XII. Lake Hopatcong Foundation Updates

Marty Kane provides an update on Foundation activities. He states that the next Boating Regulation Commission meeting is on Wednesday in Toms River. He states that the Antique Boat Clubs 50th Anniversary will be held at Lee's County Pavillion on September 27th. He states that the Museum open house marking 60 years will be held at the State Park on September 12th. Mr. Kane states that work on the fountain will be completed in two weeks. The fountain should stay on until the water comes over the dam again. He states that the Foundation Lake Loop is on October 5th. There will be boat races on the lake the weekends of the 13th & 14th and 20th & 21st. Commissioner Steinbaum asks why the fountain height is lower. Mr. Kane responds that it keeps more water in the Musconetcong to keep flow below the dam.

Princeton Hydro Updates

Dr. Fred Lubnow provides an update on Princeton Hydro's activities on the lake. He states that water clarity is about 25% better than 2024. In Crescent Cove clarity has also improved. In addition, the cyanobacteria concentrations in the open water have improved. He states that soluble reactive phosphorus over the sediments was 0.005mg/L in 2025 and 0.05mg/L in 2024. The reduction is due to the alum treatment in the fall of 2024. The results of the August cyanotoxin monitoring program showed that no cyanotoxins were measured. In Crescent Cove lack of cyanotoxins is attributable to the Army Corps ERDC treatments. Princeton Hydro also completed their Aquatic Plant Survey last week. The dominant species are Eurasian Water Milfoil and Tape Grass. He states that Princeton Hydro has also been working on the redesign of the bioretention strip in Jefferson Township. They have requested a preapplication meeting with NJDEP for the Roxbury Basins. He states that the permit from NJDEP to conduct the remaining ERDC treatments was issued. Princeton Hydro will begin the remaining treatments next week. He states that the Philadelphia Army Corps will be onsite for treatments. Commissioner Steinbaum asks if high weed growth should be expected again next year. Dr. Lubnow believes it will be similar due to the increase in water clarity.

XIII. Updates State Park Updates

Alternate Commissioner Hamilton states the water level is 8.28 feet. He does not have an update on the Water Level Management Plan.

He states that he sent an email on the Water Level Management Plan to parks@nj.gov in August of 2024 stating that a federal environmental impact study should be completed if they are not closing the dam in the summer. He comments on Princeton Hydro's Army Corp Grant treatments and states that Phoslock depletes good cyanobacteria. He provides an example from Lake Eerie and states that Phoslock increases toxic algae and nitrogen. He comments on test strips that are available for water quality testing.

Tom Turik, Raccoon Island states that he spends the winter in Texas. He reads the Commission meeting minutes and requests that they be improved he asks if recording can go on the website. Chair Smith suggests that recordings be placed on the website.
